**Guest Speaker** was Virginia Graham, Past President of "**Friends Of Hamilton Gardens**." Most of the Gardens' development began in the early 1980s



**Year**". This exhibition has been on tour, and NZ has been able to retain it up till mid-August, due to Covid 19. If you have the chance, don't miss this one!




#### **REBUS CLUB OF HIBISCUS COAST**

# Mini Speaker - Rachel Stace

Rachel gave a very interesting and important talk about Hepatitis-C. In New Zealand 50,000 people have it, though only half are aware of it; one can and should find out by a simple blood test. Worldwide 150 million people have Hepatitis-C and it kills 500,000 each year. Although potentially fatal there is now a cure, found by New Zealander Dr Ed Gane in 2011. Symptoms are fatigue and nausea. Since 2016 Pharmac has funded Maviret which is 99% effective, an 8-week course. One should get tested, get treated and get cured. It is the first infection that has gone from disease discovery to cure in a quarter of a century.

It is the 6th largest Island in New Zealand. Great Barrier Island is an extension of the Coromandel Peninsula. The population relies on generators for power, and there are no other services like water and sewerage. The "Wairarapa" which sailed regularly from Sydney to Auckland was

wrecked at Miners Head with the loss of 121+ lives. The delay in reporting the disaster gave rise to the introduction of Pigeon Post, the first in the world.


